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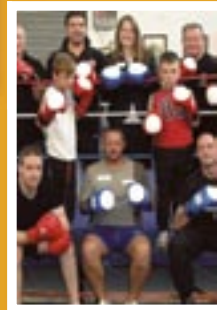

It has been a most interesting year. The difficult economic conditions have continued from 2009 into 2010. However, the Society has made good progress in difficult markets. New lending is up and so is the savings inflow from investors.

In 2010 our staff enjoyed their time and association with Leonard Cheshire Disability, our charity of the year. Results

The Society results are shown in the Summary Financial Statement and I would encourage you to read them. Although operating profits are down, this is largely due to the low interest rate environment and that rates to investors have been maintained at higher levels than most in our peer group. This reduces our interest margin and consequently profit. Overall after levy adjustments retained profits are up and represent a good set of results in the current economic climate.

Our Annual General Meeting will take place on Monday 21 February 2011 at Loughborough Town Hall starting at 6.15pm. I would urge as many of you as possible to attend. Notes

1. These Notes form part of the Notice of Meeting.
2. A member entitled to attend the Meeting and vote may appoint one proxy to attend and vote on his or her behalf. You may appoint the Chairman of the Meeting or anyone else as your proxy, and your proxy does not have to be a member of the Society. Your proxy may vote for you at the Meeting but only on a poll. A poll is a formal vote which may take place after an initial vote by a show of hands. Your proxy may not speak at the Meeting, except to demand or to join in demanding a poll.
3. You may instruct your proxy how to vote at the Meeting. Please read the instructions on the proxy form.
4. The voting date is the date of the Meeting, 21 February 2011, if voting in person and 17 February 2011 if voting by proxy.

5. In order to attend and vote at the Meeting, or appoint a proxy, you must qualify as either a shareholding member or a borrowing member.

Shareholding Members

(a) To qualify as a shareholding member, you must -

- (i) if you are an individual, be at least 18 years old on 21 February 2011 and
- (ii) have held shares to the value of not less than £100 in the Society on 31 October 2010 and
- (iii) not have ceased to hold a share or shares in the Society at any time between 31 October 2010 and the voting date, and
- (iv) hold a share or shares in the Society on the voting date.

(b) Where the shares are held jointly by two or more persons, only the first named in the records of the Society in respect of those shares can have any voting rights.

Borrowing Members

(a) To qualify as a borrowing member, you must -

- (i) be at least 18 years old on 21 February 2011, and
- (ii) have owed the Society not less than £100 in respect of a mortgage debt on 31 October 2010, and
- (iii) owe the Society not less than £100 in respect of a mortgage debt on the voting date.

(b) Where a mortgage debt is owed jointly by two or more persons, only the first named in the records of the Society in respect of that mortgage can have any voting rights.

6. In addition, you can vote only once as a member, irrespective of -

- (a) the number of accounts you hold and whether you hold accounts in different capacities (for example, on your own behalf and as a trustee), and
- (b) whether you qualify to vote as both a shareholding member and a borrowing member.

If you receive more than one proxy voting form, please let us know so that we can update our records.

7. Members attending the Meeting will be requested to produce their passbooks or other evidence of membership in order to obtain admission.

8. At the AGM, members will hear speeches from members of the Society's Board and will be able to ask questions about the Report & Accounts, Society plans for the future or any other subject in connection with the running of the Society.

If you appoint a proxy to vote on your behalf and your proxy does not attend the meeting, your vote will not be counted.

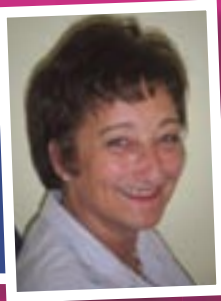

Open for (Re)mortgage Business

Hazel Mueller, Mortgage Manager, explains how homeowners may be able to save money on their monthly mortgage payments by switching their mortgage to The Loughborough.



We have regularly read during the credit crunch that mortgage lenders do not have funds to lend but this is certainly not the case at The Loughborough. Our initial thought was that it would take too long and perhaps be more hassle than it was worth, how wrong could we have been!!!

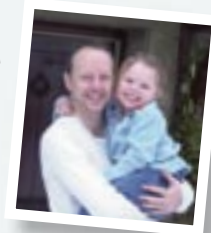

Regulation Update

Financial Services Compensation Scheme

From time to time, we need to let you have information about some of the rules and regulations that affect you and your Society. One such area is the Financial Services Compensation Scheme (FSCS) which provides assurance to savers if firms are unable to meet their obligations. The Scheme provides compensation payments up to a statutory limit which, from 31st December 2010, has been increased to the first £85,000 of an investor's total shares and/or deposits. The Scheme covers most investors in the Society unless you are:

- A large company
- A large partnership
- A large mutual association
- A local, provincial or municipal authority
- A credit institution
- An overseas financial services firm
- An operator or trustee of a collective investment scheme
- A pension and retirement fund or a trustee of such a fund
- A supranational institution
- A government or central administrative authority
- A person whose claim arises from transactions relating to a conviction they have received for money laundering

Award for Long Eaton Talking Newspaper

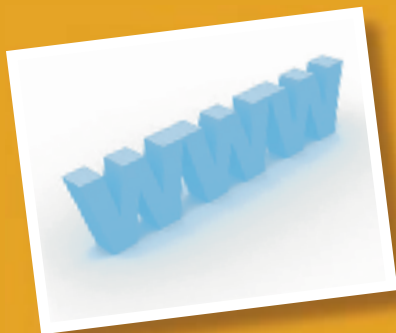
